

Dr. Ted Fulton Named

SUPERINTENDENT OF HICKSVILLE PUBLIC SCHOOLS



The Hicksville School District Board of Education announced the appointment of Theodore (Ted) Fulton, Ed.D., as the next superintendent of schools, effective July 1. He succeeded Ms. Marianne Litzman, who retired at the end of the school year after 35 distinguished years of service in Hicksville.

"Our school community made clear to us," Hicksville Board of Education past President Brenda Judson said, "that our next educational leader needed to have a track record of experience and success in unifying diverse stakeholders around a vision and strategic plan, the ability to communicate effectively with all members of the school community, and the creativity to reimagine what success for all students might look like in our schools of the future. Throughout our interviews, Ted

continually impressed the Board with his energy, thoughtfulness and past success in bringing communities together."

Dr. Fulton joins Hicksville from the Bayport-Blue Point School District, where he has worked since 2017 as the assistant superintendent of curriculum and instruction. Additionally, he has served in leadership roles for several professional organizations, including immediate past president of the New York State Association of Supervision and Curriculum Development and active past president of the Long Island Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development. A former adjunct assistant professor of educational administration. leadership and technology at Dowling College, Dr. Fulton has presented his research at a variety of conferences and forums.


His professional experiences include serving as a social studies teacher, coach, assistant principal and principal in both Nassau and Suffolk counties. Dr. Fulton possesses a doctorate in educational administration from Dowling and master's degrees in both history and educational administration from LIU Post. studies.


